Celebrate by supporting clean water for people like Zenaida:

“I would walk in the midday heat, sometimes carrying water on my head, sometimes using a cart. It was exhausting. I’ve fallen a few times. The water would spill, and I’d have to go back and start over. It was tough, and I cried sometimes.”

“When the [El Porvenir] engineers came to talk to us about the project, I told them, ‘Please, help us get water.’ I can live without electricity, but I can’t live without water,” Zenaida said.

The new water system is a dream come true for Zenaida: “Now the water comes directly to my house. It’s clean and safe, and my children are healthier. My little one, just five months old, drinks clean water every day. This water project isn’t just about convenience; it’s about health and life.”

Now, instead of walking for water, Zenaida has a small business making nacatamales and grilling meat. “The money I make from selling food covers the cost of the water, and it’s worth it. I’ve even been able to buy small things for myself, like a new shirt.”
